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# From the Director



## Dear JSMA WSU Family, Friends, and Supporters,

Creating spaces of thoughtfulness, reflection, and shared experiences is an intentional act toward community building and learning. In the past year, the conversations, dialogue, and meaning-making within the museum came from you, and each of our museum visitors.

In this 2023-2024 year end report, you will have the opportunity to learn more about each of the museum's exhibitions, and the programs and learning opportunities inspired by the art within them. You will also learn about our goals moving forward into the next year. None of the work we have done would have been possible without the dedication of our friends, supporters, and visitors to the museum.

- The museum serves the approximate 48,000 residents of its locale in Pullman, Washington, including the 17,050 enrolled WSU student population.
- School groups, including K-12 and college level students, traveled from all over the region, with one group who traveled all the way from Wenatchee!
- We worked with over 40 different WSU courses in the past year, many of which re-visited the museum multiple times.

In the Fall of 2023, we hosted one of today's most prolific and significant artists through our exhibition *Jeffrey Gibson: They Teach Love, from the Collections of Jordan D. Schnitzer and His Family Foundation.* Gibson, of Mississippi Choctaw and Cherokee heritage, was selected to represent the United States at the Venice Biennale in April of 2024.

With you, we listened and learned from a guided discussion with Jeffrey Gibson, Nimmiipuu tribal representative Nakia Williamson-Cloud, and WSU student Fabian Sanchez Mondejar, with moderator and WSU professor and Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation member Michael Holloman. We are incredibly grateful to have hosted this discussion, and thank each of them for sharing with us.

Memorable moments extended to our other exhibitions as well, including basket weaving workshops taught by Jacey Sohappy, coinciding with the exhibition Here in a Homemade Forest: Common Reading Connections. The exhibition also included commentary written by WSU students between the exhibition and WSU's common reading book, Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants by Robin Wall Kimmerer.

I am also reminded of the phenomenal turn-out to the gallery talk by guest curator Johanna Gosse for the show *Beyond Hope: Kienholz and the Inland Northwest.* Thank you to everyone who attended and socialized with us.

For fifty years, this museum has been a part of sharing art with the vibrant Palouse community. Join us for the next fifty years as we continue to share the power of art with museum visitors.



### Conservation of Bookin'

The sculpture *Bookin*', created by artist Terry Allen, was accessioned into the museum's permanent collection in 2006 and installed on the Glenn Terrell Mall outside of Terrell Library. The bronze artwork was initially formed as a tribute to President Glenn Terrell as he was well known for striding across campus while catching up on his reading. The sculpture was cast at Walla Walla Foundry, using real books.

Art conservationists from ArtsWA cleaned and rewaxed the artwork in the spring of 2024. Conservation efforts were funded by the Holland Orton Endowment.

## Jeffrey Gibson: They Teach Love

From the Collections of Jordan D. Schnitzer and His Family Foundation

August 22, 2023 - March 9, 2024

Artist Jeffrey Gibson visited the museum for the opening reception of *Jeffrey Gibson: They Teach Love* and engaged in a guided discussion about how choices of adornment communicate individuality as well as community identity. The guided discussion included historical perspectives from Native culture regarding materiality and spirituality, as well as wider contemporary questions. The conversation was moderated by Michael Holloman, Associate Professor with the WSU Art Department and enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, and included special guests Nakia Williamson-Cloud, Cultural Resources Program Director of the Nimípuu tribe, and WSU student Fabian Sanchez Mondejar, member of the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe and President of WSU's Native American Women's Association.



## Here in a Homemade Forest: Common Reading Connections

August 22, 2023 - March 2, 2024


Inspired by Washington State University's 2023-24 common reading book, this exhibition highlighted crucial themes from *Braiding Sweetgrass* through the lens of art, inviting visitors to engage in ongoing conversation about prioritizing a reciprocal relationship with the land, with each other, and with other living beings. Drawing on a diverse selection of artworks and cultural objects created by both Native and non-Native artists, including works on loan from Crow's Shadow Institute of the Arts and the WSU Museum of Anthropology.

Supplemental labels for this exhibition were written by students in the course Honors 280: Contextual Understanding in the Arts and Humanities, Inside-Out: The Art Museum as

Interdisciplinary Classroom, taught by Kristin Becker, Curator of Education.

In this course, with the Jordan Schnitzer
Museum of Art WSU as a classroom, students
utilize current exhibitions, permanent
collections, visiting artists and other related
resources to gain an appreciation of the
world of contemporary art, as well as some
art history. Coursework includes: Learning
about materials and processes used by artists
and curators to tell and preserve stories;
Learning about activities used by museum
educators; Relating art to other disciplines;
Researching and writing about art; and
Making an artwork of their own.

Guest curator Johanna Gosse led a talk and discussion about Edward Kienholz and Nancy Reddin Kienholz in the museum galleries on April 12, 2024. *Beyond Hope* explores the collaborative artistic practice of artist Ed Kienholz and his wife, Nancy Reddin Kienholz, during the decades they spent living and working in the small northern Panhandle town of Hope, Idaho. Using key works from the exhibition, the gallery talk will further contextualize the notion of place as a generative context for the Kienholzes' artistic practice.







#### Master of Fine Arts Thesis Exhibition

March 26 - June 29, 2024

For over fifty years the museum has hosted Fine Arts Graduate student thesis exhibitions. This year the museum hosted WSU Master of Fine Arts students Mozi Jones and Reika Okuhara.

## Glass Comes Alive in Pullman

August 29-30, 2023

Hallie Meredith, Assistant Professor of Art History in the WSU Art Department, alongside John McCloy, a Director in the WSU School of Mechanical and Materials Engineering, engaged in interdisciplinary public talks about ancient and contemporary material and making. The lectures contextualize the museum's Marian E. Smith Glass Collection, on view in the Smith Center for Undergraduate Education.

Alongside the interdisciplinary discussions were demonstrations by glassblowers from the Tacoma Museum of Glass Mobile Hot Shop. WSU students and the public attended the multi-day series.

## First Year Experience Event

September 12, 2023

WSU's First-Year Programs invited students, faculty, and staff from First-Year Focus courses and UNIV 104: College Success Seminars to the Jordan Schnitzer Museum of Art WSU for music and refreshments, as well as activities and conversation in response to current exhibitions.







#### Main objective:

Opportunity for students to interact with their professors as well as their peers outside the classroom.

#### Live Performance:

WSU students performed with Crimson Ties, WSU's World Music Ensemble led by Professor Darryl Singleton. Other students were encouraged to participate in a collaborative music-making performance.

Students completed a survey as they left:

- 100% responded that they had enjoyed the event (with only 7% of those responding "so-so" rather than a definite "yes")
- 98% responded that they had talked to new people
- 70% responded that they would visit the museum again; 28% responded "maybe"; only 2% responded "no"
- 94% responded that the event had made them feel more comfortable talking to faculty













## Ribbon Skirt Workshop

October 12-13, 2023

Native students made ribbon skirts in a workshop led by Robbie Paul (Nez Perce), retired Director of WSU's Native American Health Sciences.

Joelle Edwards, Director of the Native Student Center, explains: "Ribbon skirts, shirts, or pants are a clothing item that Native folks wear for special events...honoring events, funerals, ceremonies. I wear one during Indigenous Peoples' Day, during Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness (MMIW) Day, for funerals, or for events at the Native Student Center. Skirts are made from fabric and then have ribbons sewn onto them. They may be all sorts of colors or designs, depending on what the maker likes or how they plan to use it: It might be red for MMIW or crimson and gray for WSU events."



## WSU Children's Center Visit

October 26, 2023

Collage and adornment activity with K-3rd graders from WSU Children's Center After School Program. The students created art work in connection to the museum's exhibitions, including artwork from Jeffrey Gibson: They Teach Love, from the Collections of Jordan D. Schnitzer and His Family Foundation.

# Moscow Charter 4th Graders Meet WSU Human Development Students

November 15, 2023

Introduction to the Field of Human Development, HD 200 and Moscow Charter School 4th graders visited the museum together in a project facilitated by Scholarly Assistant Professor Katie Forsythe and Kathryn Bonzo. WSU students engaged with the 4th graders and their interpretation of art in the museum.

Kristin Becker's Honors 280: Inside-Out: The Art Museum as Interdisciplinary Classroom learned stitching techniques from Apparel, Merchandising, Design and Textile (AMDT) faculty member Armine Ghalachyan. Using gathered remaindered AMDT fabric for final creative projects, students collaged patchworked designs inspired by the museum's fall exhibitions.
